Mobile Phone Communication

- **Be sure to set up an International phone plan with your provider before you leave** Everyone with a phone should download WhatsApp and click on the group invitation sent from Louri via ChurchCenter
- The purpose of using WhatsApp is to keep every group informed about important details or updated in case of schedule or location changes.
- When calling a UK number from your US mobile phone, you must dial beginning with a +44 and drop the first “0” from the number. For example, if you want to call a UK restaurant and google shows that their number is 07490691212, then from your US phone you would dial +447490691212

Spending Money in the UK

- If you have a mobile phone with Apple Pay or Google Pay, you can use your phone to pay for 95% of your purchases. The UK adopted contactless payment universally long before the US, so it is very common.
- If you do not have a payment method on your phone, then you can use a bank debit card as long as it has a chip (or it is contactless) and you know your pin number
- You can also get Great British Pounds (GBP£) from any currency exchange location in the US or UK.

- If you need GBP£ in cash, you should get a minimal amount before we leave by using any currency exchange option



What costs are covered?

Food & Meals

- Breakfast, lunch, and dinner are included at Creation Fest from Wednesday through Sunday, July 31st-August 4th.
- Breakfast in London & Paris is included with our lodging
- Meal at Franco Manca, Saltbox, Astronomer, and Dishoom are already covered

Travel

- Coach fare to and from LAX, Heathrow, and Cornwall
- Oyster card for London Underground (Prepaid £50)
- Round trip Eurostar train fare to and from Paris
- London Bus Tour
- Paris Boat Tour



What costs are *NOT already* covered?

Food & Meals

- You will pay for food, if needed, at the airport on both travel days, and at rest stops on our way to and from Cornwall / Paris
- You will pay for most dinners in London (aside from those already indicated on above page)
- You will pay for food in Paris, and during your free time in London (with the exception of breakfast, which is included at UCL and Jo&Joe)

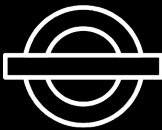
Travel

- Any public travel in London exceeding the £50 prepaid amount on your Oyster card
- Any Travel using taxi, Uber, Lyft, or other rideshare services.



London Travel Information

- Follow your leader, stay in your group
- Each leader has a phone and access to our staff in case anything happens during the trip. It is very important that you remain with your group leaders
- You will be provided with an Oyster Card for travel
- When entering the tube station, use your Oyster Card to tap the yellow circle on the ticket barrier. The doors will open and close quickly and only one person can enter at a time. Also, you must exit the ticket barrier when you end your journey which requires you to use the same card to tap out.
- When boarding a Bus, use the same yellow circle to tap your Oyster card. Once your journey ends you do not need to tap out.



Travel Safety & Etiquette

- On the road, pay careful attention to traffic as it is very congested (look **right** first when crossing the road!)
- When in a train station, always stand on the right of an escalator.
- Mind your volume while on the Tube, in the Tube stations and on buses
- The doors on the train shut very quickly, be sure you enter quickly with your entire group, preferably with a leader getting on board last.
- If you accidentally don't get on the tube with your group and the doors have closed, stay on that platform until a leader returns to get you. Do not leave the platform. The leader of the group will get off with the whole group at the very next station and have the group wait there while he\she backtracks to the previous platform for the separated team member



Border & Customs

- What should you say if/when speaking with a Border Control/Passport Screening Agent? It's important to simply say this: "I am attending a music festival in Cornwall and touring London."
- The key phrases are "attending" and "touring". Avoid using the term "volunteering" because it raises a lot of questions about work and work visas, which will only cause confusion



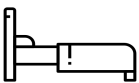
Protecting Valuable Belongings

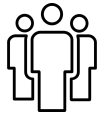

Prayer Guide

Throughout church history, great movements of God nearly always begin with prayer. Through prayer, the church receives direction and provision for its mission, and God receives glory and credit for the work. If we desire to serve London, the most effective way to start is in prayer. As we call upon the Lord and seek guidance from Scripture, the Holy Spirit will reveal opportunities for the gospel of Jesus Christ to go forth in power. The purpose of these London Prayer Groups is to pray effectively through:

Researched Insight

Scripture, as well as the history and culture of London, will fuel our prayers. Our London schedule will include biblical teaching as well as historical overviews of some London boroughs. Participants will then be assigned to teams, which will focus on praying for specific areas on different days. While praying for these districts, we also want to pray for the strength, growth, and perseverance of the churches that minister there. There are many amazing churches in this city, and Reality Church London is privileged to partner with them in the wonderful work of gospel ministry.

Responsive Insight

As we observe and interact with local residents, we can be motivated by Christ's love and compassion to pray for them. While immersing ourselves in each community, we can also ask God to reveal idols and spiritual strongholds (every culture has them).

Revealed Insight

As we firmly ground ourselves in the word of God, we believe that the Holy Spirit will not only make us aware of the needs of local people, but He will also show us how to pray for and meet those needs. We'll also trust God to lead us in the conversations we have with residents along the way. These sorts of opportunities only come about through walking, observing, and praying.

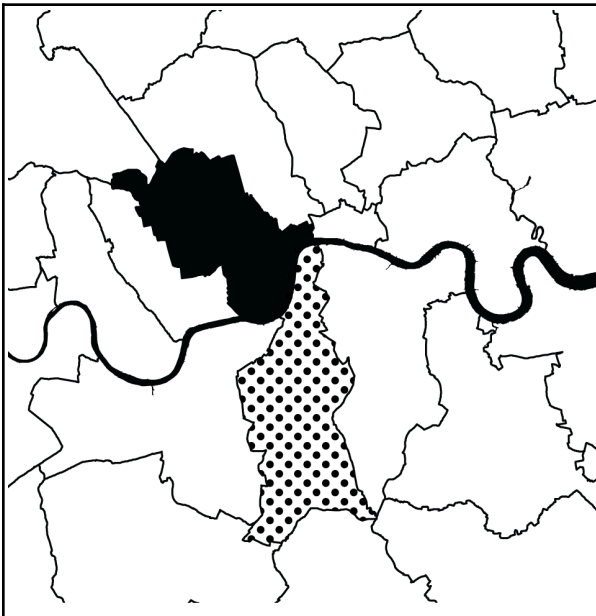
Praying Through London

- While walking through the neighborhoods, we want the participants of these prayer groups to be constantly praying! However, we want to make sure what we are doing is productive and beneficial. Here are some key ways to do this:
- Avoid blocking walkways or streets, especially while praying
- Avoid gathering as a large group and praying corporately in busy spaces. We certainly encourage prayer as teams, but be wise in discerning appropriate places to do this.

- Remember that there is not only one posture for prayer! You can pray while walking, with your eyes open, quietly or to yourself, and in other ways that may be conducive to different environments.
- We trust that everyone participating in our UK Outreach Team is not doing so simply to take a vacation or to sightsee, but to faithfully join in the mission of God in London. Please act in accordance with this by:
 - Keeping “tourist” activities to a minimum during sessions and times dedicated to prayer group activity
 - Staying with your team and not going off to do your own thing
 - Upholding the daily schedule and being punctual
 - Acting above reproach when interacting with people in the prayer groups and around people you meet in London.
 - Please avoid speaking harshly or cursing, keep sarcasm and cutting humor to a minimum, and seek to act appropriately with members of the opposite gender.

Prayer Districts

Westminster & Lambeth



While one of the smallest areas in the UK, Westminster is densely populated with 250,000 residents and close to a million daily commuters and tourists. The extremely diverse mobile and transient population is made up of over 180 nationalities. The borough is marked by its landmark sites including the Palace of Westminster, which is the meeting place of the United Kingdom's Parliament. Across the Thames from Westminster, Lambeth is home to the London Eye as well as many local shops, offering a less-crowded alternative to the busyness of Westminster.

Westminster

Areas of Interest:

Oxford Street (300 Oxford St, Westminster, London W1C 1DX)

Originally known as the main route in and out of London, Oxford Street transformed into a premier shopping site at the end of the 19th century with the opening of department stores like John Lewis and Selfridges. Much like Camden Market, the wealth of shops and restaurants leads to high congestion with approximately half a million visitors daily.

Buckingham Palace (London SW1A 1AA)

Built in 1702, Buckingham Palace was originally home to the Duke of Buckingham. It wasn't until 1837 that it became the home and office of the reigning monarch, beginning with Queen Victoria. His Majesty King Charles III is the current resident. There is a daily musical procession marking the Changing of the Guards, which begins at 11:30AM and lasts about forty-five minutes. If the royal standard flag is flying at full mast, it means the king is there.

Westminster Abbey (20 Deans Yd, London SW1P 3PA)

Formally known as "The Collegiate Church of St. Peter, Westminster," the abbey was once home to monks and has been the venue for every royal coronation since 1066. The present building began construction in 1245 and is still used for worship as well as important national events. The beautiful structure is a gothic mix of many architectural styles and complements the other landmarks around it, including the Palace of Westminster.

Prayer Points

- Inhabiting much of central London, Westminster is home to Parliament Square, the seat of the government. Pray for the House of Parliament, that the representatives would justly govern the city of London and the United Kingdom as a whole. Pray that the monarchy would be reminded of its roots in the church and would rely on God to rule the nation.

- Pray for the highly diverse mobile and transient population. As they are traveling in and out of this area, pray for unity and peace with the 180+ nationalities. Pray that the increasing population would be beneficial to the city's health and economy.
- With the high number of tourists and daily commuters, along with how densely populated it is, Westminster has one of the highest crime rates – a lot of it being petty crimes. Pray that tourists would not add to this impact, but would help sustain the borough. As you are walking by vendors, pray that they might come to know Christ and live according to His truth.

Lambeth *(if time permits)*

Areas of Interest

Imperial War Museum (Lambeth Rd, London SE1 6HZ)

The Imperial War Museum was created to record and provide understanding of the military war efforts and sacrifices of Britain and its Empire since 1914. The museum has free admission, so this is a great opportunity to learn more about the history of the country as a whole.

London Eye (London SE1 7PB)

The London Eye is the most popular tourist attraction in London and a symbol for the city, with over 3.75 million visitors every year. Sir Richard Rogers said, "The Eye has done for London what the Eiffel Tower did for Paris, which is to give it a symbol and to let people climb above the city and look back down on it. Not just specialists or rich people, but everybody." This is a great opportunity to pray for London as a whole, especially if you are able to make it on board and see the city from the sky.

Kennington Park (Kennington Park Rd, London SE11 4BE)

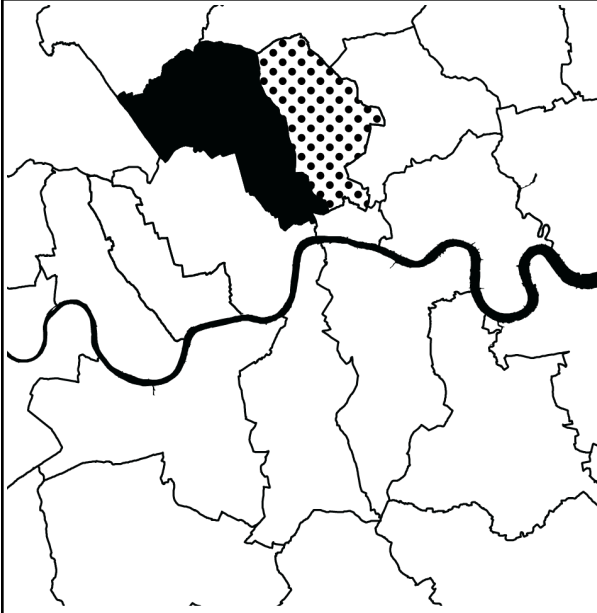
Kennington Park is a park near the center of the borough that borders the Kia Oval (a famous cricket training ground) and the Oval Farmers' Market. The park has hosted many large gatherings of the church, led by men like George Whitfield and John Wesley. It is a great place to stop and eat lunch, interact with and get to know people who live in the area, and to hear about their life and experiences.

Prayer Points:

- According to the 2010 Marmot Review, the number of people using mental health services in Lambeth is three times the national average. Another study noted that 25% of residents feel extremely isolated. Pray for those affected – for proper medical, psychological, and spiritual care, and for the church to be thoroughly equipped to come alongside those struggling.
- The church of William Wilberforce (a leader in the movement to abolish slavery in the UK in the late 1700s to early 1800s) is in this region (Holy Trinity Clapham). This would be a great place to pray for racial tensions in London and to pray for the role of Christians in communicating and demonstrating the power of the gospel in dispelling racial injustice.
- Lambeth is currently in the midst of varying levels of gentrification within its borders. This situation has caused some serious disagreements between the city council members and residents; pray for healthy and productive dialogue. Pray for provision and protection for those being displaced by these trends, and pray for the businesses, apartment complexes, and other industries entering into

the area to be hospitable, marked by compassion and care for people. Pray for ambassadors of the gospel to be in this area.

Camden & Islington



Located in the north side of London, Camden is the center of all things alternative from art and culture to music and fashion. The emergence of the railroad industry and the construction of Camden's underground station in 1907 shifted the area from a small town to the booming metropolitan area it is now. Growing retailers, tourism, and entertainment have led to the borough being the third-largest economy in London and seventh-largest in the United Kingdom. Adjacent to Camden is Islington, a highly diverse borough that is the second-smallest in London.

Camden

Areas of Interest:

London Zoo (Regent's Park, London NW1 4RY)

Since its opening in 1828, the London Zoo has been influential in the conservation and preservation of animals and wildlife all over the globe and is the world's oldest scientific zoo. Located in the beautiful Regent's Park, it is home to more than 600 species of animals and birds. From the rainforests of South America to the jungles of Africa, visitors get to experience an up-close encounter with animals from all over the world.

Camden Market (54 - 56 Camden Lock Pl, London NW1 8AF)

As the largest street market in the United Kingdom, Camden Market is the fourth-most visited destination in London with over 100,000 shoppers visiting every weekend. Located in the center of the alternative culture, it offers various fashion and exotic food shops, fitting to the diversity of its visitors. Spread out over four separate markets in Camden, The Market consists of permanent shops and hundreds of stalls.

St. Pancras Old Church (Pancras Rd, London NW1 1UL)

Marked by the existing 6th-century altar, St. Pancras Old Church has Roman ties dating back to 313-314 AD. It is believed to be one the oldest sites of Christian worship in England. In 1882, St Pancras New Church was constructed less than a mile away in a Greek Revival style, differing from the rebuilt

Victorian style of St. Pancras Old Church. During World War II, the church sustained damages that have since been restored, resulting in what we see today.

Prayer Points

- Believed to have one of the oldest sites of Christian worship, Camden has deep connections to Christianity and the gospel, but has since strayed away. Pray that the gospel might once again be a prominent part of the residents' lives.
- Almost two-thirds of the jobs in Camden are in the public sector. So pray for the leaders of the town, that they will lead justly and care for all the different demographics residing in the borough.
- Camden is known for its alternative culture and viewed as having a hippie and grunge lifestyle. Pray for the young demographic, that as they are trying to find their identity, they crave something more than what the borough offers and seek Jesus. Pray that gospel-centered churches and communities would love and care for the youth.

Islington *(if time permits)*

Areas of Interest

Arsenal Museum at Emirates Stadium (75 Drayton Park, London N5 1BU)

Chronicling the history of one of England's famous Premier League Club, Arsenal FC, the museum allows visitors to get an inside look at past players and their memorabilia. Open to the public seven days a week, visitors can access the museum with "Museum Only" tickets, or it is included with a tour of the Emirates Stadium for £20 per adult.

Camden Passage Antiques Market (Islington, London N1 8EA)

Located between Upper Street and Camden Passage, this pedestrian-only street offers visitors an array of antique stalls, cafes, and shops. The street was originally built as an alley in 1767, but the first antique shop opened in 1960s, and it has since grown to over 200 dealers. Most of the stalls and official trading days are available on Wednesdays and Thursdays; however, a lot of shops and cafes are open during the weekdays.

Almeida Theater (Almeida St, London N1 1TA)

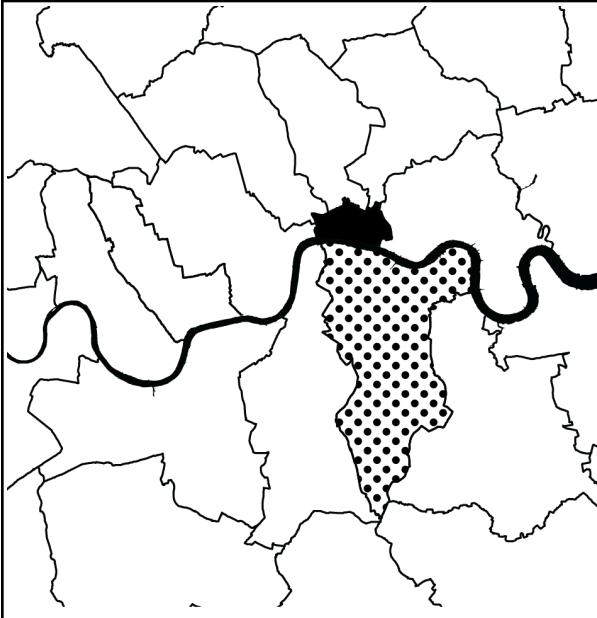
Almeida Theater opened in 1980 and is internationally known for its intimate and diverse range of dramas that push the envelope and seek to ask the big questions. Many successful plays have started here and moved over to the West End.

Prayer Points:

- This area has been experiencing a lot of gentrification in the past couple decades, specifically in the southern region closest to The City. Wealthy young professionals who are attracted to the Victorian style houses have been moving in and driving property prices up. Pray that the wealthy would see the needs of the area and care for the deprived that also live there.
- In addition to the socio-economic gap, Islington has a high population of individuals from various ethnic minorities. So pray for unity and peace not only between the wealthy and the poor, but especially among the different ethnic groups.

- There are two prisons in this borough: one for women and one for men. Pray that gospel- centered ministry and fellowships would reach out to the the incarcerated, and that the men and women would have open minds and hearts to receive Christ.

City & Southwark



Situated in the heart of London, The City is the “original town of Londinium” founded by the Romans in 50 AD. This one-square mile borough is home to many of Britain's beloved attractions and international finance. With over 250 foreign banks, it is a leading financial and business center of London, the UK, and Europe. Across the Thames is Southwark, which is home to many historic theaters and galleries populating the northern part of the borough. The area's geography is a combination of vibrant, active venues/attractions in the northern region and a more suburban feel in the south.

City

Areas of Interest:

St. Paul's Cathedral (St. Paul's Churchyard, London EC4M 8AD)

While not the original building, this site marks the first cathedral that was built after the English Reformation, when the Church of England split from the Roman Catholic Church and the authority of the Pope, under the reign of Henry VIII. The current structure was built in the 17th century after the old building was destroyed in the Great Fire of London in 1666. Since then, the church has been a symbol of resistance and a tower of strength, especially during World War II. In recent history, it is marked by the wedding of Prince Charles and Diana and home to the Jubilee celebration of Queen Elizabeth.

Bank of England Museum (Bartholomew Ln, London EC2R 8AH)

Chronicling the history of the Bank of England, the museum builds awareness and understanding of the bank's role and function as the leading financial center of the UK. Founded in 1694 at the height of England reestablishing itself as a global power, Bank of England works with other institutions to maintain monetary and financial stability in the ever- changing economic climate.

Monument of the Great Fire of London (Fish St Hill, London EC3R 8AH)

The site marks where the Great Fire of London allegedly broke out in 1666, which led to staggering loss of property and immense social and economical problems. The monument not only served as a

marker but was also meant to function as a scientific instrument measuring barometric pressure in London.

Prayer Points

- Though geographically it is a small borough, The City is filled with lots of churches. So pray for the churches in this area, that they would preach the gospel and love the city and its people.
- This area dates back to 50 AD and Roman rule, just years after Jesus's death and resurrection. Pray that Londoners would be reminded of the great history of this city and all that God has done from the beginning, and that they would once again be open to the good news of Jesus Christ. .
- Pray for those who work in the financial sector. The City serves as the center of international finance and commerce, and is home to the Bank of England. Pray that those who work there would deal with the finances justly and be able to view money through the lens of the gospel.

Southward *(if time permits)*

Areas of Interest:

Metropolitan Tabernacle (Elephant and Castle, London SE1 6SD)

Founded in 1650, the Metropolitan Tabernacle is the church home of famous theologian and pastor Charles Spurgeon and a place where tens of thousands have given their lives to Jesus. This would be a good opportunity to reflect on the history of God's church throughout London and to pray for the many churches in this area, including Southwark Cathedral (which is just blocks from the Borough Market), St. George's Cathedral, and St. Mary's Cathedral.

Shakespeare's Globe Theatre (21 New Globe Walk, Bankside, London SE1 9DT)

Right on the bank of the Thames, the Globe Theatre is perhaps the most renowned playhouse in the world. The original structure was built in 1599 and was famously home to Lord Chamberlain's Men (one of which was William Shakespeare) before it was shut down by the Puritans in 1642. The current reconstruction was completed in 1997. This venue serves as a representation of the thriving arts and entertainment industries in London.

Borough Market (8 Southwark St, London SE1 1TL)

The Borough Market is one of the oldest and largest food markets in London, celebrating its 1000th anniversary in 2014. The market serves as a massive gathering place, so it would be a great place to interact with local residents and get a chance to learn more about the city and the people. Be mindful of the opening times. The Lunch Market is open Mondays and Tuesdays from 10AM-5PM. The Retail Market operates on Wednesdays and Thursdays from 10AM-5PM, Fridays from 10AM-6PM, and Saturdays from 8AM-5PM. The Wholesale Market operates on all weekday mornings from 2AM-8AM.

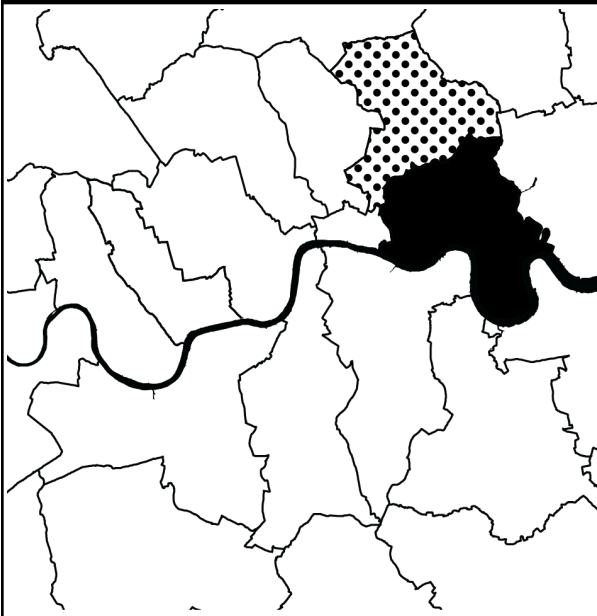
Prayer Points

- While Christianity is the dominant religion in this borough, several religious minorities are also present. According to the 2001 Census, approximately 28% of Southwark identified as non-religious or chose not to state their faith. Pray for revival in this borough and for the Bible-teaching churches here.

- Southwark's most recent census indicated that over 53% of the housing in the area was rentals, the 2nd-highest in London. Pray for the young professionals and artists who live in this area for its proximity to the center of town and low property prices, and pray for gospel-centered community to mark this borough. .

- As mentioned above, the arts and entertainment industries have a home in Southwark. Pray for these industries and the people in them, for the influence of their messages to be driven by the gospel, and pray for the love, joy, and contentment found in Christ to triumph over the idols in these industries.

Tower Hamlets & Hackney



Tower Hamlets is a culturally diverse area that was once associated with poverty, crime, and WWII devastation. It is now marked by many efforts to revitalize the area (especially for the 2012 Summer Olympics), which has attracted young professionals and artists. Tower Hamlets also has the highest Muslim population in all of Britain. Bordering to the north is Hackney, a young, creative, and culturally diverse area of the city.

Tower Hamlets

Areas of Interest:

Old Spitalfields Market (Horner Square, Spitalfields, London E1 6EW)

This market is known for its vintage fashion, arts and crafts, and food and is representative of the revitalization of the area. Like many other markets in the city, this is a community gathering place and a wonderful area to make friends as you shop and browse! Pray for the people you meet!

Brick Lane (Brick Lane, Shoreditch, London E1 6QL)

Be sure to try one of the curry houses (delicious Indian/Bangladeshi food) on Brick Lane! Tower Hamlets is home to Britain's largest Bangladeshi population. Walking Brick Lane also shows you a glimpse of the area's artistic community (notice all the art galleries) and popular nightlife.

Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park (London E20 2ST)

Restoration of this area was pushed forward largely because it was home to the 2012 Summer

Olympics. When visiting the Olympic Park, pray for those involved in London's sports and athletic industries. Pray that God would bring world athletes to know Him and that they would use their platform to proclaim Christ.

Prayer Points

- Canary Wharf and the Docklands area of Tower Hamlets is the financial hub of the UK. It clearly shows the stark contrast of wealth and business brought to the area by new development; however, most of the workers in this district do not call Tower Hamlets home. Around this area, you may start to understand this stark contrast of extreme wealth alongside extreme poverty in this ever-changing borough. Pray that the area would ultimately experience spiritual regeneration through Christ. Pray that the business men and women who only travel to Tower Hamlets for work come to know Christ and understand God's heart for the people who call the area home. Pray for equality of resources and generous distribution of wealth amongst those in need. Pray for God's design of one person's plenty supplying another's need to become true of this area as people come to know Him.
- As this is Britain's largest concentrated Muslim community, pray that Jesus would reveal Himself to the Muslim community as the way, the truth, and the life. Ask Him to give this community dreams of Jesus, showing Him to be the true, holy and righteous One. This area has the lowest proportion of Christians of any London borough (according to a 2011 study). Pray for the Christians who do live in this area, that they would be bold and fearless in the proclamation of Christ with their Muslim friends.
- Pray for people of Tower Hamlets who have experienced exclusion due to poverty and ethnic/cultural divides. Pray that they would be included into the body of Christ.

Hackney *(if time permits)*

Areas of Interest:

Clarence Road (104 Clarence Rd, London E5 8HB)

Clarence Road was the sight of the 2011 Hackney Riots, a violent confrontation between citizens and police. The riots were an outward expression of decades of frustration surrounding the growing divide between rich and poor, rising rents, unemployment, government cuts, and more.

Broadway Market (Broadway Street, London E8 4PH)

This market boasts a wonderful selection of food and art vendors. It is, in many ways, a community center for the area of Hackney. The current market is also a reflection of the gentrification of the area, something to be mindful of as you meet people and pray for the area.

London Fields (London Fields West Side, London E8 3EU)

Historically, this park was used to pasture livestock. These days, on a warm day, you will be guaranteed to find the grass at London Fields filled with people enjoying the sun and a picnic. It's also known for being a host to many cricket games since the beginning of the 19th century.

Prayer Points

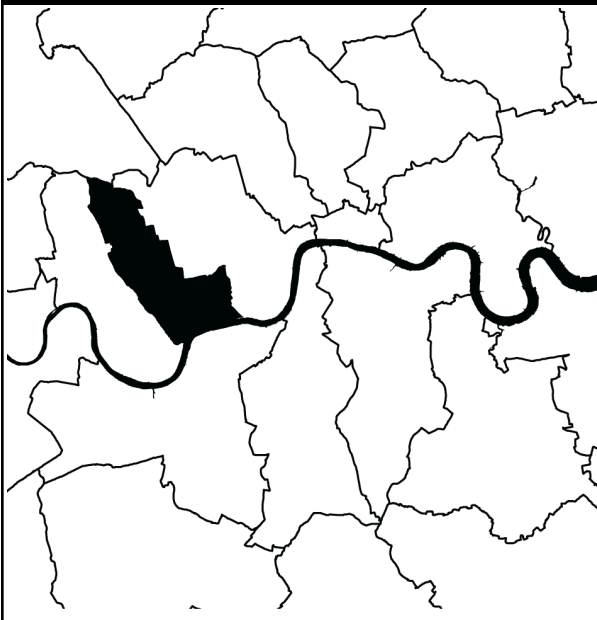
- Gentrified areas like Hackney are often filled with tension because the locals who have been there a long time often cannot afford the new rent and lifestyle changes that are brought into the area. This can leave people displaced and looking for a place to belong. Pray that residents of Hackney,

new or old, would ultimately find their place of belonging in Christ. Pray for changes to the area to actually serve the people of Hackney well.

- As mentioned above, the 2011 Hackney riots symbolize the struggle against inequality and injustice, often linked to race relations between communities. Pray for the people in this city who feel like they are without a voice and have experienced great inequality and injustice. Pray that they find comfort and hope in the God of justice and mercy.

- Pray for the arts community and creatives that call this area home. Pray that they would come to know God as the ultimate artist, and that their work would be great reflections of the beauty God has created. Pray that they use their skills and creativity to glorify God and help others know Him too.

Kensington & Chelsea



Though it may be the smallest of boroughs in London, Kensington and Chelsea (K&C) is one of the city's most affluent and has some of the most expensive residences and commercial properties in the world. Representative of the more "posh" elements of London, the borough is frequented by many cosmopolitan Londoners and tourists.

Tower Hamlets

Areas of Interest:

Sloane Street (175 Sloane St, Belgravia, London SW1X 9QG)

A marker of the high fashion culture in London, Sloane Street boasts flagship stores for many of the world's most famous brands, like Harrod's, Tom Ford, Dolce & Gabbana, and more.

Stamford Bridge (Fulham Rd, London SW6 1HS)

The home of Chelsea Football Club, Stamford Bridge is one of the many iconic footballing venues in London. Football (i.e. soccer) is an integral part of London culture and a source of great pride and identity. At this venue, you can make it your goal (pun totally intended) to meet locals who will be

eager to give you a history of the club and the area; maybe doing so will lead to great conversations about Jesus!

Royal Albert Hall (Imperial College Rd, Kensington, London SW7 2AP)

The RAH is one of London's (and the UK's) most historic and treasured venues. Opened in 1871, the venue hosts over 400 music concerts, ballets, and screenings every year. The venue represents the "upper-class culture" of K&C.

Prayer Points

- K&C is the smallest borough in London but the most densely populated in the entire country. It contains some of the most expensive residential districts in the entire city, country, and world; however, it is also home to districts with high levels of public housing and poverty. It also has the highest imbalance of high and low earners. These extremes can lead to tension and unrest, so pray for God's peace in this region, for the exposure and repentance of the idols of wealth and security, and for God to be recognized as the source of provision for residents and visitors to this area.
- As explained above, K&C is home to many individuals and companies that have immense influence in London and to the rest of the world. Many, unfortunately, promote messages contrary to the gospel; pray for these individuals, their companies, and their employees. Pray for the truth and power of the gospel to overpower the idols and harmful standards which many of these companies advocate, specifically in fashion.
- Many royals have residences in K&C, specifically at Kensington Palace (including Prince William, Duchess of Cambridge Kate, and formerly, Prince Harry). Pray for the members of the royal family – for regenerated hearts that are committed to Jesus Christ, so that they will use their influence not just for social good but as ambassadors of Christ.
